The ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines were created by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages in order to provide a means of assessing the proficiency of a foreign language speaker. The guidelines are broken up into different proficiency levels: Novice, Intermediate, Advanced, Superior, and Distinguished. Additionally, each of these (except Superior and Distinguished) is further subdivided into Low, Mid and High.
